3. Student of the Month (SOM) - This is an individual award given to an outstanding choir member in each choir on the first of each month for *dedication in rehearsal time*. It is not talent recognition, but rather work ethic recognition
4. Satisfaction of a job well-done in an enjoyable, interesting, and challenging class

Supplies

Grading

How the portions of your grade are weighted:

Guided Practice Assessment: Daily Rehearsal Work	45% of grade
Summative Assessment: Live Performance Work	30% of grade
Assessments During Learning: Singing Tests & Written Assignments	25% of grade

Guided Practice Assessment (45%)

Participation: Daily Rehearsal Work

Each day in class you will be assessed for your growth as a vocalist based on your demonstrations of competency. You will sing daily and demonstrate excellent body positioning. The main variable here is effort. Part of your grade is your ability to put forth the effort to learn vocal performance skills. Not everyone begins with the same experience level, but effort can take people further than they ever thought possible. You will be graded on progress gained through active participation in rehearsal

Summative Assessment (30%)

Live Performance Work

Students can choose to either perform in each concert or write Performance Papers. **Each Performance Paper is due 2 weeks after each performance.** In the concerts, students will be graded on the quality of your performance in vocal skill and professionalism. This is a performance-based class, so attendance at performances is vitally important. We will attend GMEA (Georgia Music Educators Association) Performance Evaluation as a REQUIRED activity.

Performance Paper

Attend and critique a live musical performance (or a movie/recording if necessary) with singing. It can be a musical, a concert, dinner theater, a musical revue, an opera, or whatever. Make sure to keep the program or make a copy to turn in with your paper, signed by a parent or guardian. **Your critique must touch on these 4 points:**

- **10 pts Presentation** observations – who, where, what, why (for money, worship, fun, etc.?), attire, staging, amplification, audience seating, attendance, accompaniment, etc.
- **10 pts Repertoire** observations – style of music (pop, classical, contemporary, religious, choral, solo), composer(s), dynamic and articulation decisions, balance, comments on director/conductor or performer decisions. Are the performers also the composers? Is the music composed or improvised, or both?
- **10 pts Vocal technique** observations – posture, style, dynamics, vowels, breath control, tone, pitch control, head voice, chest voice, diction
- **10 pts** The paper **must** include no less than **ten** musical terms like: major, minor, flat, sharp, staccato, legato, tone, intonation, crescendo, dynamics, piano, forte, key, tempo, meter, time signature, etc.

(10 pts) The paper must be:

1. At least two full typed pages
2. Double-spaced with 12 pt. Times New Roman font, aligned left

Tests & Written Assignments (25%)

Singing Tests and Written Assignments

You will usually have time to complete them during class. There will be theory tests, including one during each exam week. Music literacy is a vitally important part of becoming an excellent musician! Late work will generally be penalized 10% for each day it is late. Periodically, you will be tested on how well you are learning music. Sometimes these will take place in the classroom; sometimes you will make recordings and send them in. Grading criteria:

- Breath management, posture
- Tone
- Accuracy of part & diction (pronunciation of language)
- Intonation (singing in tune)
- Rhythm

Performance Attire

Ladies: Floor length black formal dress from Cousins Concert Attire. Ladies will be fitted during school and we will order the dresses at the same time. Dresses cost approximately \$85 and the Choral Department will work with everyone to ensure that all ladies are dressed appropriately. Minimal jewelry will be allowed. Black dress shoes, preferably flats, or 1-2 inch heels. No open-toed shoes or sandals, please. More information will come.

Gentlemen: Black Tuxedo, black or white collared tux shirt, black bowtie and cummerbund, black dress shoes, black socks, white undershirt. Tuxedos cost about \$140 and students will be measured in class. No powder blue ruffles, please! More information will come.

Any student uncomfortable in these options is encouraged to speak to Mr. FitzStephens to find a third option.

UGA or GSU SingFest! (September)

A great opportunity to spend a day at GSU/UGA singing, listening to great singers, and enjoying camaraderie with other schools in the area, all while being directed by the wonderful GSU or UGA conductors.

Open Mic Night (February)

We will have an Open Mic coffeehouse for one night only! Students will have the opportunity to perform their own music or poetry for an audience of their peers and families. It is a fun, supportive, easy-going night everyone is sure to enjoy.

All State Reading Chorus (January 26-28)

All State Reading Chorus is for those who love sight-reading and would like to get to experience a wide variety of choral music in a short amount of time. Auditions involve sight-reading individually. Auditions are October 30th.

All State Honors Chorus (February 16-18)

All-State Honors Chorus is difficult, but is an **AMAZING** experience.

First round of auditions: November 5th. Students will sing a selected solo song, scales, and sight-read.

Final Auditions: January 20,— students will sing the all-state music for judges. If accepted, you will attend the performance on the UGA campus. Deadline for check: September 8

PROFESSIONALISM/PROCEDURES IN REHEARSAL

You must have a pencil and paper in your folder each day. This is part of your participation grade.

1. Keep cell phones in backpacks and backpacks in the designated area in the back of the room at ALL times. Devices should be OFF during all rehearsals and performances. If a student is caught with a device more than twice, disciplinary action will ensue.
2. Keep several sharpened pencils in your folder so you will always be prepared; Pay close attention to what the conductor says, and lightly mark the music in erasable pencil, not in pen!
3. Rehearsal posture: sit comfortably and properly without slouching. Slouching is counterproductive to producing a quality sound and can result in back pain.
4. Students should raise their hand and address all major questions to the conductor instead of discussing things among themselves. If there is a small musical question or bowing concert, quietly check with your section leader. When the conductor works with one section of the choir, one's focus of attention should remain on the concept being taught because they probably apply to another section or individual as well.
5. Stay engaged even when the conductor is not working directly with you or your section. Students should know what is being rehearsed even if it does not include your section or part. For example, if a conductor is working on a specific passage with the altos, the director should be able to re-engage the entire group with a simple "OK, with everyone now."
6. Books, homework, and other activities do not have a place in rehearsals. When you have a rest or do not play in a section, you are expected to stay engaged and learn from listening. Students engaged in *other* activities will lose participation points.

As a parent, how can I support the choral program? You can do so in many ways. You can contribute time and/or money. Here are some specifics.

- 1) **Uniform Alteration:** We are building an inventory of dresses and tuxes so future chorus students don't have to buy their own. If you are able to help alter clothes please help.
- 2) **Accompanist:** If you are a pianist, PLEASE let me know. I would love to have a parent volunteer to accompany rehearsal and/or concerts. The music is rather simple usually. The time requirements would be minimal.
- 3) **Financial support:** We can always use help writing grants for funds. Anybody with grant writing experience that can help would be so appreciated. We are operating this choral program on a very limited budget. We are given \$1200 to run the entire chorus program for the entire year. I teach 200 students. The cost of going to festival in March is about \$1000. So, if you wish to contribute to our Lakeside Chorus Boosters to help us defer some costs, your donations are tax-deductible.
- 4) **Chaperoning:** We need lots of chaperones for our Large Group Performance Evaluation trip.
- 5) **Copying:** I need a parent to come in once per week to copy items for me.
- 6) **Concessions:** We need help with concessions for concerts, fundraisers, and Open Mic Night.
- 7) **Video camera for concerts - We always need help in this department**

CURRICULUM OVERVIEW	
Unit - Performances:	Each student will be involved in a performance schedule outside of class time, which includes the concerts listed on calendar. Missing a concert FOR ANY REASON will result in a zero for that concert. Make up assignments are given at the discretion of the director.
Unit - Auditions:	Each student will audition with the Lakeside Chorus to determine their strengths and to plot a course to develop musical fundamentals in each student.
Unit - Assessment:	Students will be assessed regularly in class through singing tests during each period, class work, graded paperwork, and a final exam each semester. Other assessments may be given in addition to these.
